ORIGINS AND CONSTRUCTION OF THE HENRIETTA MARIE

THE HENRIETTA MARIE WAS A BRITISH SLAVE SHIP BUILT IN THE EARLY 18TH CENTURY, SPECIFICALLY DESIGNED OR ADAPTED FOR THE TRANSATLANTIC SLAVE TRADE. SHIP SPECIFICATIONS AND OWNERSHIP

THE HENRIETTA MARIE WAS LIKELY A TWO-MASTED SHIP, WITH A TONNAGE ESTIMATED BETWEEN 100 AND 150 TONS. THE VESSEL WAS OWNED BY BRITISH MERCHANTS INVOLVED IN THE TRIANGULAR TRADE, EXCHANGING GOODS FOR ENSLAVED PEOPLE IN AFRICA, TRANSPORTING THEM TO THE AMERICAS, AND RETURNING TO EUROPE WITH COLONIAL PRODUCTS SUCH AS SUGAR AND TOBACCO. OWNERSHIP RECORDS INDICATE THAT THE SHIP WAS PART OF A FLEET OPERATING PRIMARILY OUT OF LONDON OR BRISTOL, TWO MAJOR PORTS INVOLVED IN THE SLAVE TRADE DURING THAT ERA. THE HENRIETTA MARIE'S CONSTRUCTION AND OUTFITTING WERE TYPICAL OF SLAVE SHIPS, MODIFIED TO MAXIMIZE SPACE FOR HUMAN CARGO AT THE EXPENSE OF CREW COMFORT AND SAFETY.

THE SLAVE TRADE AND VOYAGES OF THE HENRIETTA MARIE

THE HENRIETTA MARIE MADE AT LEAST TWO DOCUMENTED VOYAGES AS A SLAVE SHIP DURING THE EARLY 1700s. THESE VOYAGES FOLLOWED THE TRIANGULAR TRADE ROUTE, WHICH CONNECTED EUROPE, WEST AFRICA, AND THE CARIBBEAN. THE SHIP'S PRIMARY FUNCTION WAS TO TRANSPORT ENSLAVED AFRICANS FORCIBLY TAKEN FROM THEIR HOMELANDS TO PLANTATIONS IN THE NEW WORLD, WHERE THEIR LABOR WAS EXPLOITED FOR ECONOMIC GAIN. THE SHIP'S VOYAGES ARE AMONG THE EARLIEST WELL-DOCUMENTED EXAMPLES OF BRITISH INVOLVEMENT IN THE TRANSATLANTIC SLAVE TRADE.

Voyage Routes and Slave Trading Practices

On its outbound journey, the *Henrietta Marie* sailed from England to the West African coast, where it acquired captives through purchase or seizure in collaboration with local traders. Once loaded with enslaved individuals, the ship crossed the Atlantic to the Caribbean islands, including Jamaica and Hispaniola, where the enslaved people were sold. After the sale, the *Henrietta Marie* returned to England with goods produced by slave labor, completing the triangular trade cycle. These voyages were fraught with danger, including storms, disease, and potential resistance from the captives on board.

Documented Voyages and Cargo

Historical records confirm that the *Henrietta Marie* embarked on at least two voyages between approximately 1699 and 1700. On these trips, the ship transported an estimated total of over 300 enslaved Africans. These voyages highlight the early scale and brutality of the British slave trade, which would grow exponentially over the next century. The cargo carried back to England typically included commodities like sugar, rum, and cotton, all produced through the exploitation of enslaved labor.

Conditions Aboard the Slave Ship

The conditions on board the *Henrietta Marie*, as with most slave ships of the era, were inhumane and brutal. Enslaved Africans were confined in cramped, unsanitary spaces below decks for the duration of the middle passage, the transatlantic crossing. The ship's design prioritized maximum human cargo capacity over ventilation or hygiene, leading to rampant disease and high mortality rates among captives and crew alike. Understanding these conditions is crucial to comprehending the human cost behind the story of the *Henrietta Marie*.

Living Conditions for the Enslaved

Enslaved people were typically chained together in tight quarters, with barely enough room to sit or lie down. The lack of fresh air, poor nutrition, and exposure to illnesses such as dysentery and smallpox caused the deaths of many during the journey. The psychological trauma of captivity, combined with physical suffering,
