-IR Verb Conjugation

For regular -ir verbs, the present tense endings are:

- yo: -o
- tú: -es
- él/ella/usted: -e
- nosotros/nosotras: -imos
- vosotros/vosotras: -ís
- ellos/ellas/ustedes: -en

Example: *vivir* (to live)

- yo vivo
- tú vives
- él vive
- nosotros vivimos
- vosotros vivís
- ellas viven
