THEORY AND PRACTICE IN ARCHAEOLOGY ARE DEEPLY INTERCONNECTED REALMS THAT SHAPE OUR UNDERSTANDING OF PAST HUMAN BEHAVIOR, CULTURE, AND SOCIETIES. - CULTURAL ECOLOGY: EXAMINING THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN HUMAN SOCIETIES AND THEIR ENVIRONMENTS.
- SYSTEMS THEORY: UNDERSTANDING CULTURES AS COMPLEX SYSTEMS INFLUENCED BY VARIOUS INTERNAL AND EXTERNAL FACTORS.

3. POST-PROCESSUAL ARCHAEOLOGY

EMERGING IN THE 1980S, POST-PROCESSUAL ARCHAEOLOGY CRITIQUES THE OBJECTIVE STANCE OF PROCESSUALISM. IT EMPHASIZES SUBJECTIVE INTERPRETATIONS AND THE ROLE OF INDIVIDUALS IN SHAPING CULTURE. KEY IDEAS INCLUDE:

- INTERPRETIVE APPROACHES: FOCUSING ON MEANING-MAKING AND THE SIGNIFICANCE OF ARTIFACTS WITHIN CULTURAL CONTEXTS.
- MULTIVOCALITY: RECOGNIZING THE DIVERSITY OF PERSPECTIVES AND VOICES IN THE INTERPRETATION OF THE PAST.
- CRITIQUE OF OBJECTIVITY: CHALLENGING THE NOTION THAT ARCHAEOLOGY CAN BE ENTIRELY OBJECTIVE AND ADVOCATING FOR A MORE REFLEXIVE PRACTICE.

METHODOLOGICAL APPROACHES IN ARCHAEOLOGY

THE METHODOLOGIES EMPLOYED IN ARCHAEOLOGY ARE INFORMED BY THEORETICAL PERSPECTIVES AND ARE CRUCIAL FOR THE SUCCESSFUL PRACTICE OF THE DISCIPLINE. DIFFERENT METHODS ARE ADAPTED BASED ON RESEARCH QUESTIONS, SITE CONDITIONS, AND AVAILABLE TECHNOLOGIES.

1. EXCAVATION TECHNIQUES

EXCAVATION IS ONE OF THE MOST TRADITIONAL METHODS IN ARCHAEOLOGY, INVOLVING THE SYSTEMATIC DIGGING OF SITES TO UNCOVER ARTIFACTS AND FEATURES. KEY TECHNIQUES INCLUDE:

3. LABORATORY ANALYSIS

AFTER EXCAVATION, LABORATORY ANALYSIS ALLOWS ARCHAEOLOGISTS TO STUDY ARTIFACTS IN DETAIL. METHODS INCLUDE:

- TYPOLOGICAL ANALYSIS: CLASSIFYING ARTIFACTS BASED ON THEIR TYPES AND FORMS TO DRAW CULTURAL CONCLUSIONS.
- RADIOCARBON DATING: DETERMINING THE AGE OF ORGANIC MATERIALS TO PROVIDE CHRONOLOGICAL CONTEXT.
- MATERIAL ANALYSIS: USING TECHNIQUES LIKE X-RAY FLUORESCENCE (XRF) TO UNDERSTAND THE COMPOSITION OF ARTIFACTS AND THEIR SOURCING.
